



Dear Ons Dorp Villagers,

Did you know your recycling items have a new national standard which came into effect on the 1st February, 2024

ITEMS ACCEPTED from 1 February 2024:

- Glass bottles and glass jars (empty and clean).
- Tin, steel and aluminium cans (empty and clean).
- Plastic bottles (grades 1, 2 and 5) from your kitchen, bathroom and laundry.
- Plastic food containers (grades 1, 2 and 5 only).
- Newspapers, magazines, and advertising mail.
- Paper, cardboard including empty pizza boxes, egg cartons and window envelopes.





Before you recycle

- Empty & rinse all containers DON'T CRUSH OR FLATTEN.
 - ALL LIDS NEED TO GO IN YOUR RUBBISH BIN.
- Containers should be NO LARGER THAN 4L.
- Remove bubble wrap, polystyrene or plastic packaging from cardboard boxes before flattening tape and labels can remain.
- Items should be larger than 50mm x 50mm.
- DO NOT bundle items, leave them loose.





ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED from 1 February 2024:

- Items less than 50mm (e.g. caps, small cosmetic and spice containers)
- Aerosol cans (steel and aluminium)

- Plastics 3, 4, 6 and 7
- All lids
- Liquid paperboard (beverage cartons and juice boxes)
- Aluminium foil and trays



Plastic we <u>can't</u> take Kirihou e <u>kore</u> e taea



Certain types of biscuit trays, clear food wraps and packaging, blister packs and toys.



Bread and produce bags and other soft plastics.



Disposable Styrofoam cups and plates, some meat trays and take away containers.



Other plastics or combined materials such as Tetra Pak and milk cartons, foil packaging.



Items you **CANNOT** put in your recycling

- × Bagged recycling or rubbish.
- × Soft plastic packaging.
- × Food waste.
- Clothing, shoes and bedding.
- Medical waste (including face masks).
- Garden waste.
- × Building waste.
- Chemicals and hazardous waste.
- Nappies and sanitary products.
- × Empty aerosol cans.
- Liquid paperboard (e.g. milk and juice cartons).

- Cookware, Pyrex ® and drinking glasses.
- × Window glass and mirror glass.
- Light bulbs, fluorescent tubes and lamps, including Compact Fluorescent Lamps – they contain toxic mercury.
- Electronic and electrical items.
- Batteries lithium batteries can explode and have been known to cause fires in recycling trucks.
- × Gas bottles.
- × Polystyrene packaging.
